When we were children and went to river with aunties and uncles – they would make sure we were safe and that each and everyone would come together. What happened in early days has got to come back. Each and every one of us has to have healing before we can journey on into the future.

We have to come together again as one and come closer to oneness. Got to come together as one again. The land around here has a great capacity to do that, to heal... in a way that's not separating. It's something that would bring people together."

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- \$25,000 in grant funding initiatives and promotional avenues provided to numerous festivals across the Shire.
- \$4 million in grant funding secured to deliver the Bellingen Memorial Hall Transformation Project.
- Funding submission through Destination NSW attracted a \$100,000 tourism campaign increasing visitation rates, additional investment and economic growth to the region.
- \$1m grant secured to enhance the visitor experience and provide attractive, safe and convenient access for all who visit Dangar Falls.
- Development of three separate apps for the shire centres of Bellingen, Urunga and Dorrigo, providing digital access to events and attractions.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- The HUB has engaged with more than 83 community organisations, hosted 1,241 events and attracted more than 13,838 guests in the past year making it one of the busiest council community facilities in our shire.
- \$326,880 delivered to redevelop Dorrigo's Coronation Park, providing improved access and infrastructure to enable seniors and those with disability to easily access and use the park.
- Council prioritised an investment of \$143,000 and secured \$112,000 in grant funding to develop, design and co-deliver the Urunga Tidal Pool Project.
- Our library network hosted 484 events which attracted 4,459 people across the shire.
- \$153,260 secured to deliver the Urunga Library Redesign & New Technology Project to enhance the user experience of all library visitors.
- The Urunga Arts Space has attracted more than 140 participating local artists, hosted 22 individual exhibitions, attracted 10,000 visitors and generated more than \$80,000 in sales revenue.
- A community grant of \$5000 has funded the establishment and maintenance of an outdoor classroom for Bellingen Public School to learn more about Aboriginal culture and the continuation of connection to country.
- The innovative DAISY Player (Digital Access Information System) is available at all 3 libraries provides a complete audio substitute for print material, plays talking books and music and is specifically designed for use by people with impaired vision and dyslexia.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- \$885,000 grant secured to deliver Stage Four of the Bellingen Main Street works including the installation of a feature trellis shade structure along Church Street, new landscape walls, feature footpaths and cobble stones, kerb and guttering and road and carpark resurfacing.
- Preliminary works have been undertaken by local tradesmen and artisans to restore the iconic Soldiers Window as part of the larger Memorial Hall Transformation Project.
- The Why Local Government Matters (WLGM)
  research was championed by Bellingen Shire
  Council and saw the Mid North Coast Joint
  Organisation of Councils commission UTS to
  investigate how and why residents value the
  activities and role of local government confirming
  Bellingen Shire is an extraordinary place to live.
- Collaboration efforts to develop a new Growth Management Strategy for the Shire were recognised and awarded winner of the Community Partnerships and Collaboration Category at the 2019 New South Wales Local Government Professionals Excellence Awards.
- Our road network renewal program has resurfaced an additional 16 kilometres of poor condition sealed roads.
- Gravel re-sheeted 7.8km of road and graded 80km.
- Reduced the shire's 22 load limited bridges down to 15.
- Council championed the formation of the Mid North Coast Joint Organisation (MNCJO to collaborate and lobby to support our regional priorities including the development of the MNJCO Timber Bridge Renewal Prospectus, which represents a \$20 million investment to address a total of 91 bridges or 41% of the regions ageing timber bridges.
- \$54,000 grant secured to refurbish the Bellinger Valley North Beach Surf Club.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- \$866,000 invested in our three waste management facilities to improve sustainability outcomes and customer service levels.
- 61% of council's total investment funds strategically placed with institutions divested of the fossil fuel industry.
- 220kW of free and renewable power produced, and savings reinvested into our \$285,000 Revolving Energy Fund (REF).
- State of climate emergency declared and planning for a workshop underway to operationalise our emergency declaration.
- Instream riverbank stabilisation works and the restoration and rehabilitation of 1.6 hectares of riparian zone land within the Earl Preston Reserve.
- Stage One of the Coastal Management Program (CMP) invites our community to participate to determine key coastal management issues and review current management practises.
- \$511,000 of Environmental Levy funds invested towards 18 projects, and \$40,000 via the Levy's Community Fund Grant Program.
- Snapping turtles from Taronga Zoo's successful captive breeding program were released into the Bellinger River to boost the numbers of this endangered species.
- Business case developed to attract funding that will support the work of the Great Koala National Park initiative.
- Investment in the shire's water future delivered a new two megalitre drinking water reservoir at South Bellingen, and a new 90 kilolitre wastewater pump station at Urunga.
- \$2.5 million invested to ensure Bellingen has access to clean drinking water and to protect the environmental health of the Bellinger and Kalang Rivers.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- Council commissioned UTS to conduct an independent review of council's financial sustainability. The review found Council's longterm financial sustainability is tracking well. In particular, the improving technical efficiency, low levels of debt, prudent spending, and the steady improvement in asset condition all indicate that Council is doing an extraordinarily successful job in challenging conditions.
- Customer Satisfaction Score (CSS) target 75%.
   Achieved Customer Satisfaction Score = 90%.
- Customer and Business Services Team winner of the 2019 National Local Government Customer Service Network Awards' Customer Service Team of the Year Category for the second time since their last win at the Award's Inaugural 2015 event.
- Insurance premium rate of 1.81% is below the LRG rate of 2.36% and premium costs have decreased by 70% since 2010.
- Extensive Service Delivery Review undertaken to address organisational effectiveness and strategic capacity to deliver on council's priorities.
- Reflect, an infrastructure asset management, inspection and decision support tool developed that provides office and field based staff with the flexibility to capture and track maintenance requests, incidents, asset defects and maintenance activities.
- Create, Council's online engagement platform featured 20 projects which attracted 4,200 visits and 253 submissions from 198 people.



#### **FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Council has seen a steady improvement in operating result over the past few years due to a number of initiatives that Council has undertaken, including in more recent years those commitments in its Fit For the Future (FFF) submissions. However, over the past year Council has faced a number of challenges that has resulted in a return to an operating deficit for 2018/19. Council has met 5 of the 7 Office of Local Government performance ratios for the year and will continue to strive towards long term financial sustainability.

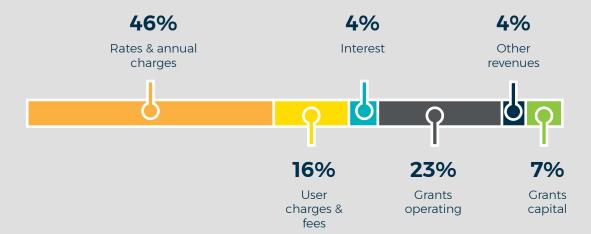
