Introduction

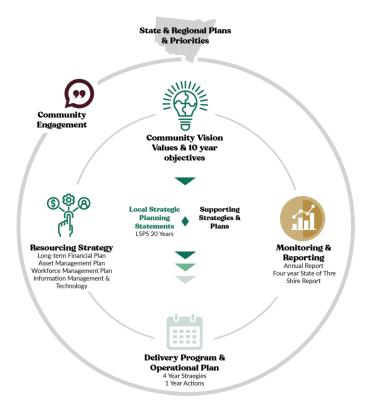

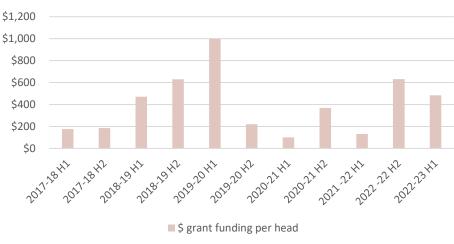
Trend Data Analysis



Visitation for the first half of the financial year is similar with previous visitation numbers. Should this trend continue, and dependent on weather events, this will see similar or improved numbers at the end of the season.



\$ grant funding per head



Council has been successful in obtaining \$6,364,156 in grant funding in the first 6 months of the 2022/23 financial year. This equates to \$484 per head of population based on 13,141 residents.

Council has provided the opportunity to the community to apply for funding to support various events, activities and projects through its Community Grants Programs. Two rounds have now been undertaken with 13 organisations offered funding in the first round and 10 in the second round. A total of \$50,000 was available across the two rounds with the total allocation exhausted.

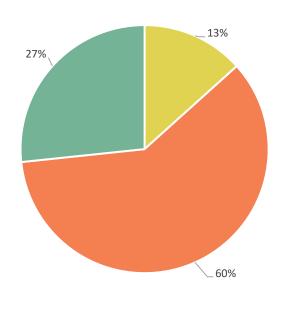

Highlights

Council announced the recipients of the 2022 Ian J. Cooper Awards for Access and Inclusion on International Day of People with Disability on 3 December at the ArtSpace Urunga in conjunction with the community Art Miinggiya exhibition and awards celebrating the Shire's creativity, diversity and healing practice of art.





On 8 September and as part of R U OK? Day, Council hosted 'A Cuppa with Council' in Maam Gaduying Park where our community were invited to grab a coffee and have a conversation with some of our staff. The morning featured a series of information stalls from local community groups who work to support our community at some of their most vulnerable times.







Council will receive just under \$3.58 million in funding from the NSW Office of Sport to support the redevelopment of the Connell Park sporting precinct.

This redevelopment will provide much needed upgrades to bring the facilities up to modern standards including unisex changeroom facilities, storage areas, improved kiosk/canteen, referee facilities and public amenities for users of Connell Park.



Council undertook consultation about ways to support healthy ageing for our Community as a first step in the development of an Ageing Well Strategy for our Shire.





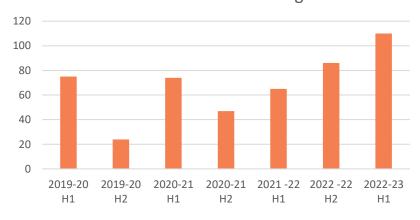

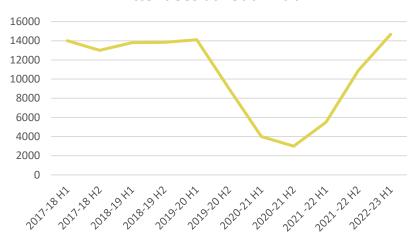

During school holidays our Libraries provided a fun way to explore the season of winter. Children aged 5-10 had an opportunity to make a snow globe and other interactive activities.

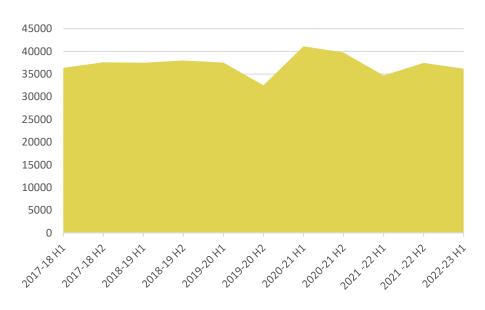

The total attendance across the 3 branches was 56 children and 29 adults.

As part of the approval for the Keevers Drive Riverbank Stabilisation works Council is establishing an offset site along Yellow Rock Road, Urunga. The site has been heavily impacted by 4wds and the subject of illegal dumping in the past. Works will establish an alternative parking area and remediate the existing access/parking area. We estimate the works will restore approximately 1300sqm of mangroves in compensation for the 396sqm impact.

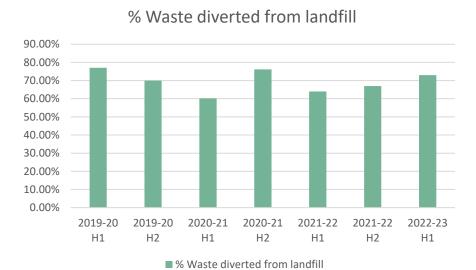

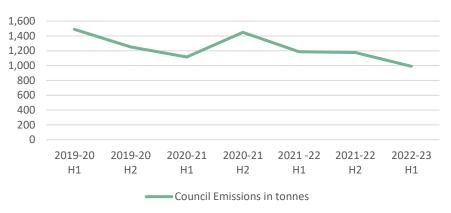

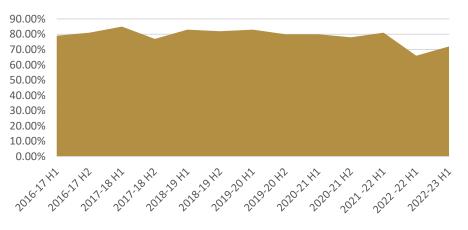
